President's Message

The Lagotto Romagnolo Club of America would like to announce that we have been accepted into the Canine Health Information Center (CHIC) database. By participating in the Chic database the club moves forward in identifying trends and health issues that may arise in our beloved Lagotto and to measure progress in eliminating them. The CHIC health database is established and maintained by OFA at no cost to our club. I encourage everyone to read the information on the CHIC website and familiarize yourselves with the program and of course participate for the long term health of the breed. The tests will benefit breeders by using the test results to identify health strengths and weaknesses in their breeding programs.

Puppy buyers will have accurate information on the testing results and be able to see the probability of whether their pup will develop an inherited disease. Both pass and fail tests are reported, so having a CHIC # does not imply that a dog is okay to breed. Researchers will receive confidential and accurate information on multiple generations for continued research.

As the Licensed Parent Club for AKC we will be provided quarterly reports from CHIC. The following tests were identified by our health committee and approved by our board to be required at this time to receive your CHIC #. In the future as other DNA tests are identified for a diseases in the Lagotto we can add them as required tests. Your CHIC # is not revoked when a new test is added, but you will be notified by the club that there is a new required test.

We would also encourage all Lagotto owners to participate in the DNA repository (optional). The DNA Repository Is co-sponsored by OFA and the AKC Canine Health Foundation. They collect and store samples to facilitate future research and testing to reduce the incidence of inherited diseases.

Hip Dysplasia - OFA Evaluation or PennHip Evaluation

Eye examination - By a boarded ACVO Ophthalmologist each year results registered with the OFA.

Patellar Luxation - OFA Evaluation

Benign Familial Juvenile Epilepsy / BFJE - DNA based test from an approved lab registered with the OFA

Lagotto Storage Disease/ LSD - DNA based test results from an approved lab registered with the OFA

DNA Repository (optional) - Participation in the OFA/Chic DNA Repository

LRCA and the NHGRI DOG GENOME PROJECT KICK OFF!

Come to the 2nd annual LRCA Specialty in Ft. Worth, TX to Contribute!

The LRCA and the National Human Genone Research Institute (NHGRI) are working together on collecting Lagotto DNA for the Canine Genome Project. We are pleased to announce the kick off will start with the 2nd Annual LRCA Specialty in Fort Worth TX. March 24th, 2017.

The Canine Genome Project's goal is to identify genetic markers linked to inherited diseases such as Cancer Susceptibility, Genetics of Complex Diseases, Genetics of Breed Morpology and Breed Origins, and History Researcher Dr. Brian Davis will be at the Specialty to collect our dogs DNA samples. The sample can be from a blood draw or cheek swabs.

For Genetic Studies, large numbers of individual's DNA are required to obtain statistically valid results Can you believe one of the first Breed clubs to contribute to the Canine Genome Project has supplied over 1,000 samples?

Let's do it!

We are counting on you and your Lagotto to contribute for future health info for our breed. Plan on stopping by the Project stand when you attend the Specialty. Your partnership is vital to the NHGERI mission of improving canine health

Peppe the Sea Dog Goes to School Eddie and Glenn Tuttle

Hello everyone, it's me, Peppe the Sea Dog! Much water has gone under the bridge since I last posted. I am now 17 months old. In February, we finished our cruise on the boat and returned to our house. So at about 10 months old, back I went to school! My goal is to follow in the footsteps of my mentor, Vando the famous Arizona Lagotto Therapy dog.

So how do you become a Therapy Dog? First and foremost your parents need to allow you to become socialized and polite when you are young. I started my schooling in Missouri with my breeder and continued with my parents. They took me everywhere: to Home Depot, to Best Buy, to the Fire Station, to my neighbor who has a walker, to the Tiki Bar, to the front of a hospital, to doctors offices, up and down in elevators and in many crowds.

What is the difference between a Therapy Dog and a Service Dog? Therapy Dogs are dogs who go with their owners to volunteer as a team to improve the lives of other people. Service Dogs are dogs who are specially trained to perform specific tasks to help a person who has a disability. Therapy dogs do not have the same special access as Service Dogs.

So how do you get started with "specialized training" to become a Therapy Dog? My Mom found that the local dog club provided training that met the standards to be certified. When I was 5 months old I took their beginning class for puppies. This introduced me to many things. The gym set up with 3 training areas was very noisy with many dogs coming and going. My head was swirling because I wanted to play with everyone. I was also nervous and had to learn to concentrate in this busy atmosphere. After class all of the young puppies got to play by themselves in a roped off area.

What is the AKC Canine Good Citizen (CGC) Program? Passing the CGC test is your goal because it lays the foundation for other AKC activities such as Rally, Obedience, Tracking, Agility, and the new AKC Therapy Dog Title.

The 10 tests outlined here:

TEST 1: ACCEPTING A FRIENDLY STRANGER

TEST 2: SITTING POLITELY FOR PETTING

TEST 3: APPEARANCE AND GROOMING

TEST 4: OUT FOR A WALK (WALKING ON A LOOSE LEAD)

TEST 5: WALKING THROUGH A CROWD


TEST 6: SIT AND DOWN ON COMMAND AND STAYING IN PLACE


TEST 7: COMING WHEN CALLED

TEST 8: REACTION TO ANOTHER DOG

TEST 9: REACTION TO DISTRACTION

TEST 10: SUPERVISED SEPARATION





What classes did you take to prepare for the CGC test? The dog club held a Beginning Obedience/Manners Program and Intermediate Obedience Program. The Beginning Obedience Class prepared me to pass the AKC Starr Puppy test. Both of these classes prepared me to pass the CGC test, which was given by a special instructor at the end.

What was the hardest part of the program? The hardest part for me was all the distraction. As I got older, my concentration increased or maybe I just got used to all the distraction.

So where are you now in all of this schooling? Well, my official AKC name now is Galante Dei Terra Incognita Peppe "CGC". After you pass the CGC test, those initials appear behind your name. The next step is to be certified as a Therapy Dog.

How do you get certified as a Therapy Dog?

There are several organizations that certify Therapy Dogs and other animals. We decided to work with Pet Partners, www.petpartners. org because it is active in our area. The Alliance of Therapy Dogs also certifies Therapy Dogs. My mentor Vando is registered with that organization.

These organizations have similar requirements and we have to pass several hours of testing so it is clear that we can work with different people with different needs.

So my plan is to send my Mom to school and do some more training on the test questions that I have to pass. There is an evaluation test for me and some other steps. I will let you know about my first assignments as a Therapy Dog. Also, I will be going to sea on the boat soon so look for some more sea stories from me in the future.



2016 LRCA National Specialty Best of Breed Winner DIG 'N DESIGNER BELLINI

April 17, 2016 proved to be a special day indeed for Christine Mullen and her lovely Lagotto Romagnolo "Bellini." Even the often unpredictable, early spring weather smiled on the Georgia National Fairgrounds providing a glorious day for the LRCA's first National Specialty Event. To say 3-year old Bellini "proved herself" in the ring is an understatement. The impressive bitch competed against 6 of the best of the best Lagotto Romagnolo champs to win the coveted Grand Champion Best of Breed sweepstakes.

There's no denying the understandable pride in Christine's voice as she describes her Bellini. She recalls the first time they met, "I helped my daughter Robin Morehouse socialize a couple of her Lagotto pups

at a performance exhibition in 2013." Christine describes walking the 12 week old pup around the grounds. The seasoned owner/handler was immediately struck by the little dog's poise and natural showmanship. "It was like she wanted to be in the show ring the way she confidently pranced around the big, noisy arena," Christine laughs. "I asked Robin if I could keep Bellini and show her." The rest, as they say is history!

Bellini's conformation training came relatively easy. With more than 20 years of experience showing German Shepherds, Papillion, and Lagotti, Mullen recognizes the markers of a great dog and in her opinion, Bellini has it all. "The only exhibition disciplines we had to concentrate on were stack and stand. The rest was intuitive for Bellini."

As for special show preparations, Mullen again points to an organic form. "I believe in three critical elements; good nutrition, exercise, and breed appropriate grooming. Of course a great personality is a big plus!" To keep Bellini in top physical condition they 'rip and romp' through the New Mexico desert for an hour or two every day. "It's wide open and the dogs love the free space." She credits the exercise for her dog's superb muscle tone. "We typically clip Bellini very short a couple of months before a show. I don't like an over-groomed dog. As her curls come in we scissor trim her coat to emphasize structure but maintain a rustic appearance."

What's next for the Grand Champion? "Bellini will be coming off the circuit soon," says Mullen. "We hope to breed her later this year. I would also like to work on some rally training and tracking work." It appears the opportunities for Bellini are limitless. According to Christine Mullen, "As true with most Lagotto, given the right training and effort...Bellini can do anything!"


Nominating Committee ReportSlate for Board of Directors 2017

Interview with our Specialty Show Chair - Jeff Fischer Questions by Bonita Uhte

First of all how much time did it take to bring this event together?

It originated as living room chatter in February 2015 and led to my volunteering to serve as Show Chair. After looking at several options, the Peach Blossom Cluster in Perry GA. became the primary candidate as the event venue. 
What did you think when you found out the long awaited Italian Judge would not be able to attend as planned?



Considering Breeding?

If you are thinking of breeding your Lagotto, you need to consider the following:

- 1. Does your Lagotto have a good temperament?
- 2. Is he/she a good representative of the breed type and conformation?
- 3. Have you reviewed the agreement (if any) with your breeder to determine if your puppy was sold with a "restricted from breeding" clause?
- 4. Have you checked your AKC papers to see if your dog has a limited (from breeding) registration?
- 5. Have you reviewed the LRCA Code of Ethics to be sure that you are in compliance with the rules pertaining to breeding a litter and placing puppies?

Note: Understand the importance of heath testing for hips, eyes, and patella. Be sure to complete DNA tests on Juvenile Epilepsy, Lagotto Storage Disease and Incorrect Coat.
